FEW hosted 95 Exhibitors as they showcased their products and services in 2010, and an even greater number is expected in 2011.


FEW is planning to look at its history through the eyes of its Past Presidents as we gather in this historical city.

It is an easy walk or a convenient trolley ride to Independence Hall, the Liberty Bell, restaurants and shopping. With 1,332 guest rooms, 92,000 square feet of meeting space, banquet facilities, restaurants and lounge, the Downtown Philadelphia Marriott is an ideal setting for a large training event. After the Revolutionary War, the fledgling nation was in chaos and bordering on collapse. Each state had its own monetary system and trade laws. There was no centralized system of defense. Many were wary of a strong central government and debates were bitter, but the checks and balances provided by three branches of government alleviated concerns. In 1787 the U.S. Constitution was adopted in Philadelphia and our nation, as we know it today, was born. Here is just a small sampling of the historical sites and ways to see them.

Independence Hall —See the original ink well used to sign the Declaration of Independence, an original draft of the Constitution and George Washington's "rising sun" chair. Representatives from 12 states gathered to shape the U. S. Constitution and create one unified nation in Independence Hall.

Liberty Bell—Located a few steps from Independence Hall, the Liberty Bell has a new home. Throughout the Center, larger-than-life historic documents and graphic images explore the facts and the myths surrounding the bell. Created in the Whitechapel Foundry in London and sent to Independence Hall in 1753, it was 12' in diameter with a 44 lb. clapper. Unfortunately, the clapper cracked the bell on its first ring, but this enduring image has been used on everything from ice cream molds to wind chimes to the NTP 2011 logo.

Philly by Might Tour—See Penn's Landing, South Street, Independence Hall, Chinatown, Avenue of the Arts, Ben Franklin Parkway, Philadelphia Museum of Art and much more. Tours depart at 8:00 p.m. nightly from the Philadelphia Marriott Downtown. Reservations are recommended. Call 215-389-TOUR.

**Phlash**—No time for a tour? Take a quick inexpensive ride on Phlash with daily service every 12 minutes to many popular locations throughout the city.

Franklin Institute — Opened in 1824 to honor favorite son Benjamin Franklin, this hands-on science museum has become Pennsylvania's most visited museum.
